

The Spirit of the Lamb of God

Before the Communion of every Mass, we three times entreat the Lamb of God Who takes away the sins of the world to have mercy on us. In so addressing the Lord we are about to receive, we use a title applied to Jesus by John the Baptist (Jn 1:29, 36) as he points out to the people of Israel and to his own disciples the one whom God sent for the salvation of the world. A title with roots deep in the Old Testament, "Lamb of God" in the Johannine writings comes to summarize the mystery of Christ in His saving passion and in his glorification.

Perhaps the most obvious connotation of "Lamb of God" is its relationship to the figure of the Paschal Lamb, sacrificed before the Passover from Egypt. Though it is true that the Passover lamb was not strictly speaking a sacrifice to take away sin, the blood of the lamb was used to avert the Angel of Death from Israel. The fourth Gospel makes quite explicit the coincidence of the killing of the paschal lambs in the Temple and Jesus' death on the cross which takes place on the eve of the Passover. The fact that Jesus' legs are not broken by the soldiers is regarded as the fulfillment of the instructions for the slaying of the Passover lambs (Jn 19:31-36; Ex 12:46) and His death is seen as, in some sense, a new Passover (cf. 1 Cor 5:7)

A second meaning of "Lamb of God" is found in its association with the Suffering Servant of the Lord, compared by the Prophet Isaiah to "a lamb that is led to the slaughter" (53:7). In this passage (Is 52:13-53:12), the deacon Philip, interpreting Isaiah for the Ethiopian eunuch, identifies Jesus in His suffering and death as the lamb led to the slaughter. It would seem that this same interpretation underlies the use of the title in the *Gospel of John*.

In the Book of Revelation, the figure of the Lamb who had been slain is the central image for the risen and glorified Christ "who loves us and freed us from our sins by his blood" (Rev 1:5). The heavenly choir falls down before Him and sings a new song in praise of Him: "Worthy art thou to take the scroll and to open its seals, for thou wast slain and by thy blood didst ransom men for God from every tribe and tongue and people and nation." The Book of Revelation culminates with the Wedding Feast of the Lamb, the final triumph of God's plan of salvation in which Christ is joined forever with those He has redeemed.

The sacrifice of the Lamb of God was ordained for redemption from sin. In the First Letter of John, the writer says clearly, without use of image, that the Blood of Jesus, the Son of God, cleanses us from all sin (1 Jn 1:9) and that Jesus Christ is "the expiation for our sins, and not our only but also for the sins of the whole world" (1 Jn 2:2).

The gift which the risen Lord gives to His disciples and to the Church on Easter night is the Holy

Spirit for the forgiveness of sins. Part of the great good news of the Resurrection of the Lord is the news of His mercy and forgiveness. His greatest desire, which should be ours also, is that the whole world will avail itself of that never failing and completely efficacious mercy.
