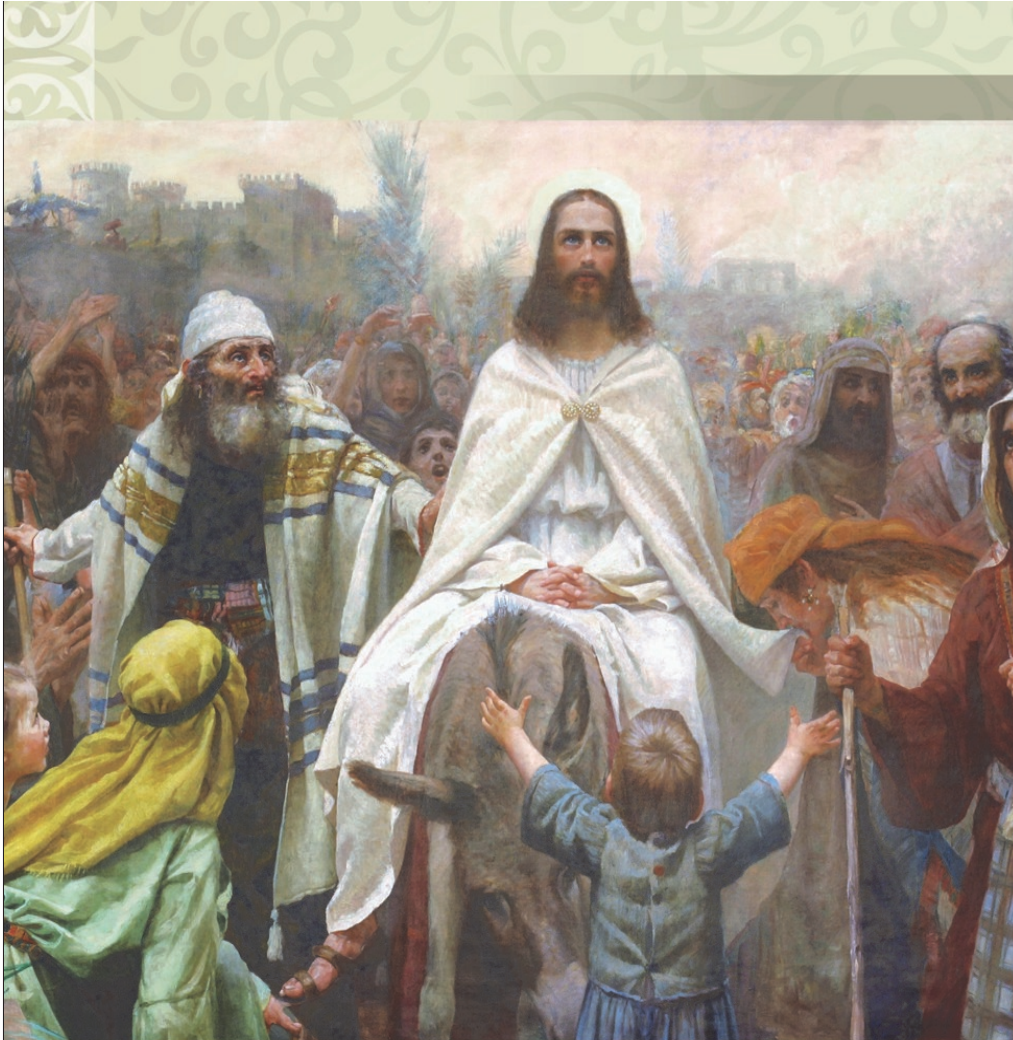

Guide to the Catechism of the Catholic Church

Hold High the Cross

Article #21



“It is his ‘love to the end’ (Jn 13:1) that confers value on the redemption, reparation, expiation, and satisfaction of the sacrifice of Christ.” Catechism, 616.

According to legend, the thorn bird sings just once in its life. Leaving its nest, it searches for a bush with long, sharp thorns. Upon finding such a bush it impales itself on the biggest thorn and begins to outcarol the lark. The world pauses to listen and God smiles with pleasure at the captivating melody. What is the message of this sacrificial music? Life’s most satisfying moment can only be purchased at the price of great pain. The reality of this message occurred in Christ’s passion and death. Of all the words and acts of Jesus, none have the capacity to touch the heart with love and gratitude more than those that occurred during His passion. That is why the passion narratives are the longest and most moving parts of all four Gospels. Christian devotion has organized reflection on the passion into the five sorrowful mysteries of the Rosary, the fourteen Stations of the Cross, and the seven last words of Jesus. Prayerful people have taken possession of the passion to praise God for this supreme act of divine love by which we are redeemed from all that oppresses us, above all from sin. All of us from Adam and Eve to the present generation, who, in pride and disobedience, have sinned are responsible for the death of Christ. The Jewish people are not to blame. “Even though the Jewish authorities and those who followed their lead pressed for the death of Christ, neither all Jews indiscriminately, at that time, nor Jews today, can be charged with the crimes committed during his passion” (*Non-Christian Religions*, 4).

The Lamb of God

The whole life of Christ was an offering to the Father for the forgiveness of our sins. John the Baptist called Jesus the Lamb of God come to take away our sins. At the Last Supper Jesus anticipated His free self-offering. In instituting the Eucharist, He spoke of His body to be broken and His blood to be poured out. At Gethsemane, He surrendered His will to the Father. There, and on the Cross, He substituted His obedience for our disobedience. At the ninth hour on Good Friday, the high priest killed the last lamb at the Temple, saying one word over the victim: “*Kalah*,” it is finished. At Calvary, at the same moment, Jesus, the Lamb of God, said His last word: “*Kalah*,” it is finished. Jesus completed His obedience to the Father. We hope to do the same. He died a real death and was buried in a real grave. The Creed says He descended into hell, that is, into the region of the just who had died. There, He opened the gates of heaven to the just ones who came before Him.

Reflection

1. *Why did Christ die for us?*

“Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures” (1 Cor 15:3). Our salvation arises from God’s initiative of love for us. “He loved us and sent his Son as expiation for our sins” (1 Jn 4:10; *Catechism*, 619-620).

2. *What was the meaning of Christ’s obedience?*


By His loving obedience to the Father. “even to accepting death on a cross,” (Phil 2:8), Jesus realized the expiatory mission of the Suffering Servant: “Through his suffering, my servant shall justify many, and their guilt he shall bear” (Is 53:11; *Catechism*, 623).

3. *What does “descent into hell” mean?*


The region of the dead to which Christ descended, Scripture calls, hell, *sheol*, or the underworld because those who are there are deprived of the vision of God. There, He opened the gates of heaven to the just who went before Him (*Catechism*, 633, 637).

Prayer

Father, by the suffering and death of your only Son, Jesus Christ, make us pleasing to you. Alone we can do nothing, but may His perfect sacrifice win us your mercy and love.
