Guide to the Catechism of the Catholic Church

Holy Mary, Mother of God

"Catholic belief about Mary is based on what we believe about Christ. What we teach about Mary illumines our faith in Christ," Catechism, 487.

The most famous decision of the Council of Ephesus, held in A.D. 431, was to declare that Mary was the "Mother of God," *Theotokos*, or God-bearer. Why were they moved to affirm the ancient faith of the Church about Mary? Because the Patriarch of Constantinople, Nestorius, was teaching that the child born of Mary was only human. He argued that only after the birth the Word of God was united with the human Jesus. Mary could not be God's mother. The Council Fathers rejected this teaching. They asserted that the Son of God was united to the humanity of Jesus from the beginning. "He made the birth of his flesh into his own flesh. Thus we do not hesitate to call the Holy Virgin: Mother of God." Though the pronouncement affirms Mary's maternity, they were primarily making a faith statement about Jesus. Teachings about Mary shed light on Jesus. This principle applies to Mary's Immaculate Conception and perpetual virginity. Some mistakenly think that the "Immaculate Conception" refers to Mary's begetting Jesus without sexual union with a man. Actually, it means that Mary was herself conceived without Original Sin. This gift of hers came entirely from Christ and prepared her for her role as mother of our Savior.

Conceived by God

The Church also affirms that Jesus was conceived sheerly by the power of the Holy Spirit in the womb of the Virgin Mary. This has its basis in the Gospels (Mt 1:18-25; Lk 1:34). Clearly, the Gospel narratives understand this conception as a work of God that goes beyond human comprehension and capability. Some people, both ancient and modern, dismiss this as a myth or a theological construction. Only faith can see this truth and treasure it. Further, the Church believes that Mary always remained a virgin. Here again, faith affirms what seems strange to unaided human reason. Since earliest times, the Church's Liturgy acclaims Mary as "ever virgin." Some object that the Scripture mentions brothers and sisters of Jesus (Mk 3:31-35; 1 Cor 9:5; Gal 1:19). The Church has always understood these passages as referring to the close relatives of Jesus. The Council of Capua in 392, led by St. Ambrose, reaffirmed the faith of the Church in Mary's perpetual virginity. Her original virginity prepared her to be the Mother of God. Her perpetual virginity prepared her to be the Mother of the Church. On the Cross, Jesus called Mary to be the mother of the redeemed. "Woman, behold, thy son" (Jn 19:26). We love Mary because we love Jesus. We love the mother because we love the Son.

Reflection

1. Why is Mary the "Immaculate Conception"?

We believe that, from the descendants of Eve, God has chosen Mary to be the mother of His Son. "Full of grace," she is the most excellent fruit of the redemption. She is totally preserved from the stain of Original Sin (*Catechism*, 508).

2. Why can we say Mary is the Mother of God?

We believe that Mary is truly "Mother of God" because her Son is the eternal Son of God (Catechism, 509).

3. What is the Church's faith about Mary's virginity?

We believe that Mary "remained a virgin in conceiving her Son, virgin in giving birth to Him, virgin in carrying Him, virgin in feeding Him from her breast, *virgin always*" (St. Augustine, Sermon 186). She cooperated with total faith and obedience in the salvation of mankind (*Catechism*, 510-511).

Prayer

Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee. Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, mother of God, pray for us sinners now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

Former Hallmark star Candace Cameron Bure says her new network will keep 'traditional marriage at the core' Jonathon Van Maren (LifeSiteNews, Nov. 19, 2022) – After making twenty films with the Hallmark Channel, known for its kitschy, cookie cutter romance stories, conservative actress Candace Cameron Bure recently joined the Great American Family as chief creative officer., a cable TV network specializing in what it calls family-oriented entertainment. Like virtually every other American entertainment enterprise, the Hallmark Channel re-

cently made the pivot to LGBT content, featuring a "queer character" in their 2020 seasonal film *The Christmas House* (a couple, Brandon and Jake, discussing adopting a child), and on December 11 will be releasing *The Holiday Sitter*, a "gay romance" in which a bachelor babysitting his niece falls for the neighbor man.

This move is unsurprising to anyone following our cultural shift—once the term "family" was redefined, it was clear that "family-friendly" would also mean something very different very quickly. What followed, too, has been predictable—the public pillorying of anyone who questions this new version of "family-friendly" and the arrival of queer Christmas films. Candace Cameron Bure found this out the hard way when, in a recent *Wall Street Journal* interview, she stated that the Great American Family would be avoiding such storylines: "I think the Great American Family will keep traditional marriage at the core," she said. The reaction was immediate.

Actress Jojo Siwa stated that focusing on the "traditional family" was active discrimination. "Honestly, I can't believe...she would not only create a movie with the intention of excluding LGBTQIA+, but then also talk about it in the press," she wrote on Instagram. "This is rude and hurtful to a whole community of people." The post was swiftly packed with positive comments and affirmation. Hallmark star Holly Robinson Peete responded: "Go make the content that you want to make but why insist on castigating others? It's the judgment for me. As a proud mom of an LGBTQIA person, the traditional marriage quote stung. Proud to be on Hallmark channel which understands the importance of diversity and inclusion of EVERYONE." None, incidentally, explained how stating that keeping "traditional marriage at the core" was "castigating people" or being "rude and hurtful."
