# The Great Deception [of being "pro-choice"]

Not all my philosophy classes go as smoothly as they do in my dreams. In real life there is always some maverick who upsets the apple cart. This never happened to Socrates in the *Platonic Dialogues*, but then, I am not Socrates.

Good morning students. I hope you are all wide-eyed and bushy-tailed today, for I have a challenging lesson that I hope will clear up a lot of confusion some of you may have. First of all, let me ask, "How many of you are pro-choice"? I see that virtually all of you are pro-choice.

Let me ask you another question, "How many of you are anti-hypocrisy"? Aha, I see that none of you identify with this nasty vice.

You may be content to hold these two positions, but this morning I want to explain to you, philosophically, that none of you hold either of them. Please don't leave the room, give me at least a bettor's chance.

I may resemble Socrates, regarded as the Father of Moral Philosophy, but only in the sense that I ask a lot of questions. Would any of you grant me the freedom of choice to grade you unfairly, to give you a mark on a test paper that is clearly far below what it deserves? Aha, I see that none of you would grant me this prerogative. But why are you pro-choice for yourselves, but not for me? If I am "pro-choice," can I not grade any paper, not according to its merits, but according to my own arbitrary and wayward choice? Is it not a bit hypocritical to claim freedom of choice for yourselves, but not for others? Is this not an example of not practicing what you preach?

Now, I hope I am not ruffling any feathers, but it seems to me that "choice" cannot be the determinative factor in making a moral decision, otherwise any choice whatsoever, including prejudice, racism, and war, would be self-justifying. But I assume, from what I hear, that all of you protest these iniquities. Are you not missing a crucial factor that allows you to choose not wildly, but well? Hold on to your freedom, but season it with reason, for it is reason that guides your freedom to what is good.

Allow me to use the blackboard to raise a most fundamental philosophical question. "Is something good because it is chosen, or is something chosen because it is good?" Please think about that for a minute. If something is good because it is chosen, then the truth of what is chosen is ignored and the only thing that counts is your will. In this case you are imposing your will on reality without considering what that reality is. However, if you chose something because it is good, then you are involved, or at least you are trying to be involved, with reality.

If I say "I love you," it is because I see something good in you. Love cannot be a choice that disregards the good of its object.

A man may make an advance toward a woman that she rejects. In this case, two choices are clearly incompatible with each other. No one choice reigns supreme. It is not possible, in a civilized society, for everyone to be "pro-choice." Chaos results when choices conflict. On the other hand, it is not only possible, but morally necessary, that everyone be "pro-reason." After all, man is allegedly a rational animal!

I hope to disabuse you of any inclination toward hypocrisy while encouraging you to make your freedom truly valuable and realistic by uniting it with reason. You have nothing to lose but everything to gain.

I know only too well that a "pro-choice" philosophy is in the air and is, consequently, highly contagious. But I urge you to think for yourselves, and resist the allurement of being "with-it" or politically correct. Philosophy demands clarity, cogency, and consistency, and, perhaps above all, courage. Dare to be philosophical! Let your philosophy not be something you inhaled, but something you figured out. . . .

Your nobility consists not in going along with the crowd, but standing against a myriad of alien forces and finding the courage to be yourselves. Make every effort to resist the "great deception" of believing that being "pro-choice" is the one-word answer to all the problems of life.
